Brothers:

Greetings From the Big Apple:

The cost of living is up again this month. In New York, to feed an average family of four, it now costs over \$81.00 a week. Most Elevator Constructors are not average so therefore it costs us more. I know it runs about \$120.00 for my family of six and thats just for food. A maintenance mechanic, without overtime receives gross and nets about \$388.00 \$250.00—\$260 after Federal, State and City taxes. After deducting your mortgage or rent, transportation expense to and from work, lunch money etc., there's not to much (if any) left of your pay. Our contract will be expiring in a few weeks and in order to keep up with our standard of living we will need a substantial raise to bring us back to where we were three years ago and then we should have an opportunity during the next contract to have wage reopeners for cost of living increases. When we settled on 15.5 cents per mile, the only stipulation for increasing the mileage was if the gas prices went up. The gas prices have remained fairly stable but everything else has gone up, i.e. tires, car insurance (has doubled) repairs. I think that the fair and equitable thing to do would be take all expenses of a car and come to a settlement. I understand there are locals on the west coast that are receiving 20 cents a mile. I have dwelled long enough on what I want in the next contract, I hope you have written your letter to the Negotiating Committee reflecting your ideas.

We all complain we are not receiving enough expenses etc., but we do forget our Brothers who are unemployed who are only receiving the unemployment check, and an occasional day on the handle. Well for them things are starting to look up. There are many small jobs cropping up on Long Island and in New Jersey along with the new Palace Hotel

on Park Avenue in the city. At this time the Chrysler Bldg. is looking for bids on modernization as well as Rockerfeller Center. I just heard on the News last night that the West Way has been approved so has the Convention Center on 34th Street. So all these signs lead up to less unemployment. However, the jobs are not coming fast enough to get all our Brothers employed at one time, but with summer and vacations coming on there should be plenty of part-time filling in for the Maintenance and Repair men going on vacation.

As a point of information: I would like to ask a favor of the other correspondents around the country. If it would be at all possible, in your next article would you be so kind as to include the pay scale for a mechanic and how much you receive per mile for driving your own personal car and the approximate percentage of unemployment. I'm sure the Brothers in Local No. 1 would be quite interested and would settle a lot of arguments.
